The term Multi-Tiered Systems of Support is often used as an overarching descriptor of Positive Behavior Intervention and supports (PBIS) and Response to Intervention (RTI), as both include a three-tiered continuum of school-wide support. The MTSS framework integrates evidence-based practice within a three-tiered approach (e.g., primary, secondary and tertiary levels of prevention and intervention), to positively impact student outcomes. In a 2014 position statement on MTSS, ASCA described school counselors as important stakeholders in the implementation of RTI and PBIS, stating "professional school counselors align their work with MTSS through the implementation of a comprehensive school counseling program designed to improve student achievement and behavior" (ASCA, 2014, p. 38). This session will support school counselors who are interested in initiating a professional learning community focused on MTSS during the 2019-20 school year.
